The iron mortsafe at Kirk O' Muir is located in the centre of the cemetery and belongs to the Bow family as recorded under gravestone numbers 147 and 148. The entrance to the mort safe is on the east side of the mort safe and the entrance gate was no longer connected to the rest of the structure. The gate was placed loosely against the mortsafe which shows signs of wear and tear.

The mounting steps at Kirk O'Muir are situated in the wall enclosing the cemetery. The first mounting steps are located to the (east) right of the entrance and lead into the cemetery between gravestone 173 and the entrance. The second mounting steps are on the North wall of the cemetery to the east (right) of gravestone 169.


